## Support staff union says school is not fire-safe

In a press release dated March 2, 1979, the Confederation des Syndicats Nationaux, representing employees at the Polyvalente Sieur de Coulonge, have stated that in that school the safety measures against fire hazard have been disengaged.

They say that the fire alarm system turns off the ventilation in the entire school to prevent a possible fire from spreading. Because of several false alarms, says the CSN, the school administration has disconnected this safety feature.

On February 20, a Mr Parent, inspecting for the Quebec government, is said to have found numerous irregularities in the Polyvalente Sieur de Coulonge and has made a list of 33 items to be corrected, among which are reparation of the fire alarm system in its entirety, instruction to the occupants regarding all the safety means at their disposition, fire drills at least once once a year, installation of fire extinguishers throughout the school, installation of a smoke detector connected to an alarm system.

The CSN wants the users of the Polyvalente to be aware of the present danger of the situation there and is also intending to pursue its search for the identity of the persons responsible for the disruption of the alarm system, and who is responsible for safety in the schools.

## Planning Council re-elects Ryan

Daniel Ryan of Davidson, who is the Canada Manpower officer for Pontiac County, was returned for a third term as chairman of the Pontiac County Social Planning Council. The election took place at the regular March meeting because there had not been enough present at either the January or the February meetings.

A series of letters were read relating to the Council's request for a Customs Office in the County. The authorities in charge of these things are looking into the matter and Tom Lefebvre M.P. is keeping track of developments as they take place.

The attempts of the Council to establish a 24 hour emergency number for the County have not yet met with any success but hope has not been abandoned.

Repairs and improvements on the Community Services Center owned by the Social Planning Council in Campbell's Bay were reported by the building committee and the financial report was accepted. It was also reported that the summer student program proposed by the Social Planning Council will probably be accepted by the Federal government.

The Social Planning Council will in the next few weeks be undertaking some work towards helping mothers apply for the recently announced tax credits.

## Pontiac students not interested in student fund

Social Planning Council animator Debbie Hudson has reported great frustration with regard to her attempts to interest students in the student fund.

Mrs Hudson's attempts to meet with the student councils of each of the four high schools have thus far resulted in only one acceptance, and this from the students of the Polyvalente Sieur de Coulonge. That group decided not to engage in any fund raising event for the student fund because they can not be assured that the student fund will be used for Polyvalente students.

The conception of the student fund dates back a number of years. The Waltham Catholic Women's League, and the Shawville Rotary Club both had the idea at the same time and presented it to County Council which referred it to the Social Planning Council. The idea was to set up a student fund which would be used to help Pontiac students in their post secondary studies towards occupations in the health and welfare fields if they would agree to work in Pontiac after obtaining their training. The philosophy behind the plan was that it would be beneficial to both the students and the people using their services, if they would return to this County after becoming trained health and welfare workers. This was to include all branches of the medical profession and the social services.

The student fund has taken many years to build and is still far from the required amount to effectively do the work anticipated by the founders. However there is a good start and with the continued support of the public, through their municipal councils and other organizations, and individual donations, it could become functional soon.

The Social Planning Council instructed their animator, Mrs Hudson, to interest the four high school student councils in each taking on one fund raising project during this school year.

The amount thus donated by each school would not be as important as the very fact of that school's participation in a project which was aimed at service towards students across the County. Applications for help in the form of loans from the fund would be accepted from all students from all four high

## Agri-Co-op still expecting grant for abattoir - sale barn

The annual general meeting of the Pontiac Agricultural Services Co-operative took place in Vinton parish hall last week with a good attendance. Present to give information from the Department of Agriculture were Gary Coupland and Roger Denault, both of the head office in Buckingham. Also present was Agronomist Roger St-Cyr of the Shawville office.

Conditions were discussed for the approval of the long-awaited subsidy from the Provincial Government. One condition was that the Co-op must provide the necessary funds to add to the Government grant in order to build the proposed abattoir and sale barn. The second condition would be that the local organization would absorb any loss on operations of the sale barn if it were not fully utilized during the initial stages of its operation. The amount of the Quebec grant has still not been officially divulged but an announcement from the Department of Agriculture is expected in the very near future.

County Social Planning Council will be held on the first Thursday of April, which falls on April 3rd, at the Services Center in Campbell's Bay at 8 p.m. All interested citizens of Pontiac County are always welcome.

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**THEATRE HERE**

The quality of theatre being produced every year by Pontiac High School is improving to the point where our only regret is the constricting limits of their auditorium.

The smallness of the facility provides a nice intimate area suitable for many uses but not room for even the entire student body to assemble.

Given the amount of work expended by many students and faculty members to provide first rate theatre each year, the drama festival is a major cultural event in the community but unfortunately they present each play only once and only 161 people can see it.

The logical way to improve the situation would be to extend the size of this little theatre. When it was built it was situated in a position which would allow for expansion later. Now that "later" has arrived. Over the years, under the tutelage of Mrs Margaret Campbell, the drama potential of the Pontiac High School has proved itself to be worthy of a larger arena.

Say what you might about money being scarce, about decreasing student population, about drama being an unnecessary frill, or about the time not being right for such extravagance. Those are all merely excuses for not moving forward with a needed facility for our town. Self confidence, social education, sense of worth, group training and a hundred other benefits accrue to those students who are so fortunate as to have dramatic training in high school. At the same time the presentation of plays becomes a most valuable link between the school and the rest of the community, and contributes to the culture of the entire neighborhood.

If this small theatre could be enlarged to a reasonable size, we could also bring in productions from outside the immediate area which cannot now come to Shawville because of the lack of adequate facilities. One hundred and sixty one people cannot pay enough admission to afford any sort of major production, be it musical, literary or dramatic.

There are a lot of things the community needs. We all have our lists and our priorities. First and foremost of course is a light industry. A swimming pool is near the top of most people's list. Maybe a community theatre hasn't been seriously thought about at all, but each year as the drama festival rolls around again we are reminded.

The point is that although some might think theatre is only for big cities, we maintain that the need is greater in a village like Shawville. Theatre is not a frivolous non-essential. Theatre mirrors and molds; both valuable functions in a changing society.

## Legal Aid - who's eligible?

There are 108 legal aid offices throughout Quebec. The purpose of this network is to provide the services of a lawyer or notary free to any economically underprivileged person.

Who qualifies- You can turn to legal aid if you do not have sufficient financial means to obtain legal counsel or to hire a lawyer or notary. In addition, your gross weekly income cannot exceed \$135 if you are single plus \$15 for each dependant.

If you are a social aid recipient, you automatically qualify for legal aid.

How to apply- You obtain legal aid by applying at the nearest legal aid regional office. You will be asked to outline the state of your finances and to give all pertinent information on your present situation.

If the general manager decides that you qualify for legal aid, he will give you a certificate of qualification. With this certificate in hand, you can get in touch with your lawyer or notary.

You choose the lawyer or notary- As a legal aid recipient, you are entitled to select a lawyer or notary

among all those who work for legal aid and all private practice lawyers who participate in the legal aid programme.

To have your case reviewed - If, on the other hand, you feel that you were unjustly refused legal aid, or that your legal aid was wrongly suspended or withdrawn, you can request that your case be reviewed. Within 15 days after the general manager has rendered his decision, send a written request outlining your grounds for appeal to: **Président de la Commission des services juridiques, Tour de l'est, 2, Complexe Desjardins, 14 e étage, Montréal.**

A few exceptions- Some legal services are not covered by legal aid. Among them are suits for slander and libel, actions in contestation of an election and defence in parking violation cases.

In case of doubt- Before coming to the conclusion that you are not eligible for legal aid, submit your case to the legal aid office in your area.



C'est avec stupéfaction que nous avons appris l'intention de la C.S.R.O. d'abolir ce poste à plein temps de directeur de l'éducation aux adultes pour la région du Pontiac.

L'argument présenté à l'appui de cette décision, la sous-utilisation de la ressource (i.e. il n'y a pas suffisamment d'heures de cours enregistrés en 1978-1979) est à notre sens complètement hors contexte et ne tient absolument pas compte des caractéristiques propres à notre région.

En effet, les normes étant faites en fonction dans les milieux urbains où l'on peut facilement retrouver de 40,000 à 100,000 personnes ou plus dans un rayon de quelques kilomètres, elles mettent tout de suite notre comté hors-jeu étant donné qu'il est composé de 20,000 habitants dispersés sur une bande de près de 200 kilomètres, de Quyon à Chapeau.

Ajoutons à cela que cette région est entièrement rurale, c'est-à-dire qu'il n'y a aucun centre urbain pouvant dispenser des services. C'est une région frontalière qui par manque de services locaux doit aller chercher ses services en Ontario. Il va sans dire que dans telles conditions le niveau culturel s'en ressent. Ajoutons à cela que notre population est composée de près de 20% de bénéficiaires de l'aide sociale et d'autant de prestataires de l'assurance-chômage.

Depuis cinq ans, c'est-à-dire depuis la création du poste de directeur de l'éducation aux adultes, on a maintenu un niveau de 3 à 4 milles heures de cours aux adultes par année. Considérant qu'avant il n'y avait presque rien, ce résultat est très bon si on tient compte de l'énorme travail d'animation et de motivation que cela pré-suppose. Retirer ce service signifie pour nous un recul de six ans. Sur quelles ressources pourrions-nous compter à l'avenir pour donner à notre population des possibilités de se développer et de se recycler afin de pouvoir accéder aux emplois, qui éventuellement seront créés dans notre région.

Ajoutons aussi que depuis ces cinq dernières années la C.S.R.O. avait inclus le comté de Pontiac dans ses priorités et pour cette raison les postes de directeur et secrétaire à plein temps se trouvaient justifiés. On a même doté le Pontiac des services d'un agent d'information. ## January 3

At a regular meeting of Council held in Luskville at 8 pm Wednesday, January 3, 1979 those present being His Worship the Mayor, William Burke, Councillors Michel Grenier, René Vaillant, Glen Nugent, Kenneth Bronson, James Stewart, Bernard Armitage and equally present the secretary treasurer.

Agenda- Resolved that the agenda be accepted with the following additions- snow removal and sanding, french minutes in Equity, garbage disposal site.

Minutes- resolved that the minutes for meetings of December 18 and 22 be approved as circulated.

Ratepayers- Salt Mountain Road- Mr Philippe Young asked why salt is not placed on Mountain Road which would take 7 tons for 21 trips in the course of the winter. He claims that the amount of traffic should justify the expense. Councillor Grenier agreed that it should be done. Mr Young volunteered to show how to rig up a truck to do the job.

Bill Garbage Collection \$700.- The Secretary treasurer read the opinion of the legal advisor stating that the Municipality did not have to pay the extra bill of \$700.00.

Snow payment and grader blades- Mr Robert Gordon asked to be paid. He also asked for scarf blades to be borrowed from the municipality.

Ditching Bill- Stanton Property- Mr Gil Fraser asked about his bill for \$775. (approx) Council agreed that he should bill Mr Stanton who could himself appear before Council for apportionment.

Cheese Factory- Pontiac- Mr Bruno Alary suggested that Council consult the Association of Milk producers prior to proceeding with the promotion of a cheese factory. Mayor assured Mr Alary that the Association would be consulted.


