Bob Gordon honoured for bravery

Bob Gordon was, on three occasions, directly responsible for saving lives and preventing further injuries with great danger to himself.

First: On October 16, 1975 Mr Orelle Trudeau, while working in a ditch excavation, was unfortunately buried by a cave-in. Bob, who was working across the street, heard the commotion and immediately ran past everyone. He jumped into the ditch and, without regards to his own chances or being buried, dug by hand to clear Mr Trudeau's head and mouth and proceeded to dig him out until the ambulance arrived. Mr Trudeau, who received a punctured lung and a concussion, most certainly would have suffered more if not for the immediate response of Bob.

Second: On April 26th, 1976 Randy Young aged 17, Kevin Trudeau aged 16, and Terry Leach aged 17, were driving through Quyon. The car skidded into the side of the Quyon Co-op, through the guard rail and into the Quyon River, which at this time of year is a white water torrent. Terry Leach was swept away and as of yet, his body has not been recovered. Kevin Trudeau climbed out of the open back window and made his way to safety. Randy Young, while unconscious, was caught by his leg under the front seat with the rest of his body hanging in the river, held up by the swiftness of the water. Bob, while closing up his garage (approximately one hundred yards away) heard the crash and Kevin's howls for help. Immediately he and two visitors, Ronnie and Robert Dowe, ran to the river. All three men jumped in trying to reach the car. The Dowe brothers, who could not swim, turned back. Bob managed to reach the car and while holding Randy's head out of the water, freed the boy's leg. However, because of the swift current, he could not reach shore. He then got Randy on top of the car while someone got a rope and pulled them to safety.

Third: On February 17th, 1977 a Miss Veronica Findly aged 10, ran down a snow bank in front of an on-coming car driven by Mr Kevin Kingsbury. While trying to avoid hitting her, Kevin's car slid into the shallow ditch and snow bank pinning

Veronica under the car. Bob, working with a backhoe at the time, saw the accident. Thinking quickly, he manoeuvred the back-hoe to the car and lifted the automobile off the young girl, and pulled her free. Veronica suffered cuts and bruises along with a burn. She was treated at the Hospital in Shawville.

In all three cases, not only has Mr Gordon's quick thinking, courageous attitude and willingness to help others contributed to the well-being of these people, but, in the past, others have had occasion to be thankful for Bob's quick response.

Bob Gordon was honored for bravery by Governor General Edward Schreyer last Friday at a Government House bravery investiture.

Child tax credit explained Monday

Specially invited to this meeting are the executives of various organizations throughout the County of Pontiac who will then be expected to return to their own communities and carry the information on to the mothers there. These could be school, church, social, hospital, men's or women's or any other type of organization, as long as the representative coming to the meeting will be willing to pass along what they learn to others who cannot attend at Shawville.

The meeting will commence at 7:30 sharp so it is hoped that everyone will turn up on time. Everyone is welcome.

Road requested

Mrs Irene McGrath, chairman of the committee to promote a road to Temiskamingue, met County Council on Monday. She had prepared a request but the subject was brought up before she had an opportunity to present it.

Over a year ago Mrs McGrath's committee submitted a dossier to Quebec for the extension of highway 148 to Temiskamingue. They have never received acknowledgement or any word from Quebec.

Now all they hear about is the proposed highway from Grand Remous or Maniwaki, but never a word about the Pontiac route.

Mrs McGrath feels that if anyone has reasons for needing this road, Pontiac County has. Pontiac has the lumber to take out, the tourism potential with all the beautiful lakes from Pontiac to Temiskamingue, and most of all Pontiac needs a good road to correct the present dead-end situation.


As things are now, this area of high unemployment will continue to suffer hardship in attracting new industry, and the young people will continue to leave for work in other places, mainly in Ontario.

Mrs McGrath told County Council that Pontiac is getting to feel more and more like an orphan County since Quebec doesn't seem to pay much attention to us.

"Maybe", concluded Mrs McGrath, "they would allow us to be adopted by Ontario; at least they furnish us with an outlet road." Irene was referring to the west end of Pontiac Rapides des Joachims, whose only access road is through Rolphton, Ontario.

County Council

From the hazards of uranium mining to the three chain law, and everything in between, the County Council of Pontiac plowed through such a wide variety of problems and concerns at Monday's quarterly meeting as could have occupied a week's deliberation. It can certainly not all be recorded in this issue, but we'll cover some of the issues anyway.

The meeting opened on a nice note with letters of thanks from various individuals and groups who were grateful for grants and other considerations, including the Calf Clubs and the Culture Committee. Also among the correspondence was a clarification by Tom Lefebvre for Portage du Fort with regard to their Canada Works project and the labour laws.

Jean-Guy Lariviere, MNA, presented information about many matters for the mayors to take back to their councils. His main topics were road work, the works projects, recreation equipment grants, Bill 125 which he urged the mayors to comment on through the CRDO although Lariviere said the Bill was not too serious in Pontiac because we have no cities here.

This led to the whole topic of the possible merger of Pontiac County and the Maniwaki area, in which case we would include a city. Eventually, late in the afternoon, the mayors resolved to send a statement to Quebec that we do not want to include any but rural municipalities in our County.

Other late afternoon resolutions in Council included a request that the municipalities in Pontiac be permitted to carry on their business in the language of their choice for the benefit of their citizens, a request that all Bills, Green and White Papers, Laws and Projects of Laws be delivered in English to the Pontiac Municipalities as soon as they are tabled in the Quebec legislature (this request to go directly to Premier René Levesque), a request that a license bureau and also a permanent office for drivers tests be opened in the central part of Pontiac County, a request for a highway to be built to extend highway 148 to Temiskamingue, a request to the new Department of Environment for an environmental study to be undertaken in the Pontiac before any further steps are made towards the operation of a uranium mine here, a request that the three-chain law be repealed among others.

The three-chain law forbids private ownership of property within three chains of navigable waters and since a chain is 66 feet, this means that there are a lot of people who don't legally own the property they have built cottages on.

The valutors met with Council to explain certain technicalities, particularly with relation to the difficult position that Clarendon finds itself in. Clarendon had paid for a complex tax map prepared by another firm, before Michel Legacé was hired by the County. The map they received covers 549 pages and the Legacé firm has found mistakes on 291 of these pages. There are also errors in the updating, in the folio numbers, and at various other parts of the work. Now Clarendon must pay for the work to be done all over again and there is no assurance that they will ever be reimbursed for the approximately \$15,000 paid to the previous firm for the unacceptable map.

Legacé has also offered enumeration services to the municipalities and will do the assessment of the unorganized territories of the County if the mayors wish them to.

Another interesting presentation at County Council was given by Miss Francine St-Jean who, with the help of Sgt Serge Barbeau of the QPF is working on a youth project. Miss St-Jean wanted to inform the mayors of her work and to invite their help and ideas. Her work is mainly with 12 to 16 year olds and prevention of delinquency is one of the purposes of the exercise.

A letter from the Fort Coulonge Businessmen was read, asking for people to start fighting if they don't want all their rights as citizens controlled by the government, specifically as per Bill 125.

Also coming under discussion was Bill 90, the RRAP program, and the touchy dog house question. Council also

START FIGHTING

The Association of Business Men of Fort Coulonge wants us to encourage the people to start fighting if we do not want all our rights as citizens to be controlled by the Government. This is their reaction of Bill 125.

On the same general topic that great patriot, W.F. Shaw of Pointe-Claire, has words of advice.

"The social and political climate in this province is sick" he writes, "and is getting worse because people would rather complain about what's happening than do something about it. If one attempts to seek just redress, one is described as a radical."

"Only when we are prepared to stand up and be counted as demanding our rights will we ever begin to see a change."

"And while we wait for this stand to be taken," continues Dr. Shaw, "the exodus will continue because of a lack of resolve in the community itself to see that justice is done."

This particular outburst was prompted by Dr Shaw's awareness of the exodus of young people from Quebec. As the tragedy of the exodus increasingly demonstrates itself, the lack of militancy on the part of Quebec anglophones becomes more obvious. We can't blame our young people, says Shaw, for leaving the province when there are no jobs for them here, even if they speak French. He is referring to the hiring practices of the federal, provincial and many municipal governments, and Air Canada, CN, Hydro Quebec and other federal or provincial Crown corporations. He finds anti-anglo discrimination even in the trades and the professions where he claims there is a cold-blooded discrimination being practised by language test evaluators.

Dr. Shaw concludes that "our French Canadian brothers will rally to us only when we begin to demonstrate that we are prepared to stand ourselves. That stand must be taken now."

Well, Dr. Shaw, we would like to know from you just exactly how your advice can be translated into action.

We would, as the Fort Coulonge Business Men urge, like to start fighting, but how?

(This question is not purely rhetorical and we would welcome an answer from anyone who can make a suggestion.)

PANAC requests environmental study

As a member of Le Comité d'action anti-nucléaire du Pontiac, Inc. I would like to present the following description of events taking place approximately ten miles from this County Council building. In it I begin with a comment made by Homer Seguin, a staff representative with the United Steel Workers of America reporting from Elliott Lake in February 1978.

"You get radioactivity in your drinking water, a little bit anyway. You get aerial fall out from the mine tailings ... We now get it from the ground, the parking lots, the roadways and in the homes. The mining companies are ignoring safety and environmental standards to cut costs and boost production and the federal and provincial government lets them get away with it..."

This is a sample of what could happen if a uranium mine were developed in the County of Pontiac. A Royal Commission (in the Ham Report of 1976) exposed the facts that the death rate from lung cancer for uranium miners at Elliot Lake and Bancroft was twice the rate of the total population. In the age group 40-60, the cancer rate was 5 times the expected rate. Lung cancer is not the only problem. Silicosis is also common and takes years to become obvious. It is not only the mines which are dangerous. Many homes in Elliot Lake and Bancroft are contaminated with radon gas which also causes cancer.

If the proposed mine near the Coulonge River were to open, radon gas would be released into the air as the uranium was excavated and as it lay exposed as mine tailings. The breezes would blow these poisonous gases far and wide reaching Fort Coulonge, Otter Lake and Campbell's Bay first ruining all our farm lands and poisoning our children.

As the rain fell, the radioactive wastes would soak into the ground and would eventually reach the Coulonge River. From there the contaminated water would flow into the Ottawa River affecting the drinking water of all those villages below Davidson on the river.

We have been given to understand that at least one uranium mining company is ready to go into production in the Mansfield, Pontefract Huddersfield area. The tests have been made and the ore samples have been sent away. The roads are there and the clearings have been made for the open pit mines.

We request that an environmental study be made before any further steps are taken towards the mining of uranium in Pontiac County. To accomplish this we recommend that the County Council contact the Department of the Environment and inform them that we of Pontiac County would like to initiate an environmental study of the area that has been selected for the uranium mines.


A Lenten Thought

Century Farms - the Inglee Homestead

William Joseph Inglee was born in 1818, that fact is ascertained by reading the inscription on his tombstone in Mohr's Cemetery, Beech Grove. Just where he was born is not so certain, some say it was in England, others claim it was in the United States.

The name Inglee itself is unusual, none other with that spelling can be found anywhere except where attached to direct descendants of this man. It is believed to be of English extraction and may be derived from the same source as such names as Ingie, meaning a fireplace nook, or the commoner Inglis often seen. But any connection with those names would date back to the dim past when surnames evolved.

At any rate William Joseph Inglee arrived in the Beech Grove area soon after John Christian Mohr began the settlement of that district. About 1849 he married Maria Mohr, a daughter of the great pioneer, the happy couple receiving as a wedding present part of Lot 20, Range 5 of Onslow, just a small percentage of the vast Mohr acreage at that time.

They built a commodious log house thereon. It is a substantial structure of precisely hewn logs as old photos of it show. In more recent years it was covered with clapboards, painted and otherwise modernized. However, the original character of the house has been preserved and for many years it has been a well recognized landmark.

Located on a scenic part of the Mohr Creek at the foot of a hill on old Highway No. 8 that section of road was often the

scene of accidents as many unwary motorists failed to negotiate some of the unexpected and tortuous turns near that point. Since the improvements found in the new 148 Highway these dangers have largely been eliminated.

Over the years that creek and its waterfalls was the site of a sawmill and a cheese factory. These have long since disappeared.

William Joseph and Maria raised a family of five, the second of whom, Joseph born in 1852 married Rebecca Mohr, also a descendant of the original settler as that pioneer was becoming the patriarch of an extensive dynasty, which would one day be found in many parts of the continent.

The Inglee family kept the Beech Grove post office in their home from 1893 to 1966 covering three generations. For many years also a country store was maintained there serving the local community.

Joseph and Rebecca both died in the 1920's. In turn their second son Athol (1893-1952) was by then operating the farm. Athol married Margaret Carty who still survives although not in the best of health. They had one son, Carmen, well known in the community. He and his wife, the former Isabell Tubman still operate the historic Inglee place and have added to the acreage. They are ably assisted by fifth generation son Carl while daughter Karen is employed in Ottawa.

So yet another Pontiac County century farm is being maintained.

English auto registration forms

In a letter to THE EQUITY signed by Ghislain K. Lafamme, avocat, Sous-ministre adjoint, of the Bureau des véhicules automobiles of the Government of Quebec Department of Transport, we are informed that the 1979 registration forms are now available in English in more than 50 offices of the Motor Vehicle Bureau but says nothing about sending them to the Pontiac people who have requested future forms to be mailed to them in English, many of whom live a great distance from a Motor Vehicle Office.

However, when we next receive our registration forms from Quebec, we should all expect them to arrive in English since we now know that English forms are available and since we have specifically requested this.

This information came in reply to our request for registration forms in English, accompanied by the requests of over seven hundred other citizens of Pontiac County.

Pontiac Culture Festival plans

On Saturday evening May 5th the Cercle des Fermières in Chapeau will be holding an evening cultural celebration with music and dancing and crafts and other activities. At the same time in Luskville there will be special events with crafts and music.

Having commenced with events at both ends of the County, the second day of the Festival will bring people together in the middle of the County. A Sunday afternoon Heritage Conference will be held at the Bryson Farm Home near Fort Coulonge and an evening of church music from several church choirs coming together at St Anne's on Calumet Island.

During Monday to Thursday, no special events have been scheduled but it is anticipated that some evening activities might be added, such as a checkers and chess competition.

On Friday there will be an afternoon social at the Legion Hall in Campbell's Bay for senior citizens coming from all the Golden Age Clubs in the County as well as residents of the three homes for the aged.

Also on Friday afternoon the artists and craftsmen of the County will be setting up their exhibitions in the Campbell's Bay Community Center.

On Sunday afternoon the Culture Festival will come to its official close back on Calumet Island where a children's production of "Hansel and Gretel" will be presented in French in the Municipal Hall. An admission of one dollar will be charged for this event, to cover the costs of the production.

Official 1917 telephone directory

The official Telephone Directory for Eastern Ontario, dated February 1917 was brought in for our perusal by Merlin Woods who found it on the farm he bought from Ken Hodgins on the 4th Line of Clarendon.

Included in this directory are a number of Pontiac villages. Portage du Fort, for instance, with its fourteen telephones, and every subscriber described as to occupation. Fort Coulonge had 20 phones at that time, and Campbell's Bay about 75.

Bryson had one telephone belonging to the Courthouse and listed under the name of Bernard J. Sloan. The number to call for Sloan was "1". Bristol Village also had one telephone, at Norway House, Norway Bay, and there was no number. Presumably one simply told the operator one wanted Norway House and the connection would be made.

Shawville had 41 phones that year in the village itself and about 200 rural subscribers in the surrounding area which included Yarm, Maryland, Ladysmith, Charteris, Schwartz, Elmside, Wyman, Thorne, and the rural areas around Bristol and Quyon.

In the village of Quyon itself there were 8 phones as follows: Station, Kennedy's Hotel, Murdock Blacksmith, Bank, Pritchards B.T. Co. Pub. Stn., The Upper Ottawa Improvement Company Boarding House, and the same company's Yard.

The whole book had only 146 pages and included a broad area with Alexandria, Winchester, Hawksbury, Vankleek Hill, Smiths Falls, Wakefield and of course Ottawa and Hull.

Any researcher wishing to see this book should contact Merlin Woods, and any reader who happens to know what Pritchard's B.T. Co. Pub. Stn. was, we'd sure like to pass on the information.
