MacKechnie proposes a small publication to County Council

A past warden, and now Pontiac County's historian laureate, Mr S. Wyman MacKechnie, met County Council on Monday to propose that they should publish a pamphlet containing a description and brief history of the County, to be used for tourist or industrial development purposes, or as they might see fit.

Having gathered the information for the booklet, including maps and lists of officials, both provincial and federal, Mr MacKechnie handed his completed manuscript to the present warden, Mr Cecil Vibert, suggesting that a committee of council should be set up to complete the project.

Mr MacKechnie said he had compiled this concise look at the County as a result of requests by several groups, both inside and outside Pontiac.

Dinner to honour Tom Lefebvre

The Auberge Mont-Blanc at Portage du Fort was the scene Friday evening, March 14th of a complimentary dinner to honour Mr and Mrs Tom Lefebvre in recognition of his stupendous victory in the recent federal election.

The dinner, a most sumptuous affair, with the Lefebvre and party officials as honoured guests along with some 75 staunch supporters from all parts of this vast constituency was through the courtesy and generosity of the management.

Seated at the manager's table (somewhat reminiscent of the captain's table aboard a luxury ocean liner) were Mr and Mrs Lefebvre, Mr Remi Fortin, president of the Pontiac, Gatineau, Labelle Liberal associations, and Mrs Fortin, Mr Fred Metcalfe, vice-president of the Pontiac section, and Mr Allen McConnery, vice-president of the Gatineau section and Mrs McConnery.

During the course of the dinner Mr Lefebvre presented the owner-manager Mr Pasqua with a large, framed picture of Prime Minister Trudeau as a token of appreciation of his hospitality.

The brief program was snappy and at times quite humorous with Fred Metcalfe acting as M.C. President Fortin said fitting tribute to Mr Lefebvre and in reply Tom insisted that his huge vote of over 16,400 majority was due to the hardwork of his supporters prompted by loyalty to the Liberal party and its leader, Pierre Elliot Trudeau.

All the speakers who followed and who elicited shouts of approval from all over the large dining hall, insisted that the 21,000 plus votes that Tom received were chiefly for Tom in recognition of his service to the constituency ever since his first election in 1965. This was born out, all declared, by his ever increasing majorities in every election, indicating much of that increase was due to support from former members of other political parties.

The evening was brought to a close with music and dancing.

Unidentified Flying object sighted

Mr and Mrs Cal Cummings of Quyon driving west on Highway 148, were escorted home Tuesday evening, March 11th, about 11:25 pm by an unidentified flying object.

They first saw a red light in the sky over the Ottawa River. This light was not blinking like a plane but was steady. They turned North on the Murray Line and drove about a quarter of a mile and were both surprised when the car lit up and on the left of them was a very large bright red light, moving very slowly approximately three hundred feet off the ground. "It looked just like one big red ball and it did not blink" says Theresa in her report of the incident. This light passed directly over their car from East to West. They watched it floating toward the North West until it disappeared behind the trees. What an eerie experience.


Some other Quyon residents saw the same light over the River toward Fitzroy Harbour on Wednesday. It seemed to be suspended in the air.

POLICE NEWS

Alphonse Boucher, 65, of Davidson, apparently died of a heart attack while driving along the main street of his village last Friday afternoon. At about ten to two his car came into collision with a vehicle driven by Mrs Laurette Dielle, also of Davidson. The Dielle car had come to a stop and the Boucher car which was following, didn't. Witnesses said they had noted that Mr Boucher had collapsed at the wheel before the collision. Constables Brewer and Boudreau were called to the scene of the accident and were able to bring back a pulse with the use of mouth to mouth resuscitation and heart massage but Mr Boucher never regained consciousness and was declared dead on arrival at the Pembroke Hospital by Dr Samson. Constable Viens investigated the accident.

In other areas, the Quebec Police are investigating several thefts which have been more numerous this year than ever before on Allumette Island. Not only are cottagers admonished to remove their television sets and other appliances from cottages during the winter but now it seems advisable to also remove their wood stoves because one of the most recent cases was the theft of a Franklin Stove from a cottage at the head of the Island.

DREE - what's it for?

Many months ago the Shawville Industrial Committee, with the cooperation of Pontiac's Member of Parliament Tom Lefebvre, and carrying a petition signed by every Mayor in the County of Pontiac, visited with the Minister responsible for the Department of Regional Economic Expansion in Ottawa. Their request was that the area designated for DREE assistance be expanded to include the Bristol and Quyon area. The purpose of this difficult and time consuming exercise was to make it possible for some new industry to settle in the area, hopefully to create jobs for at least the number of people who had become unemployed with the closing of The Hilton Mines. Eventually, the request was granted and indeed this area did become a part of the area designated for DREE assistance.

DREE grants are available to provide financial help for businesses wishing to relocate in the DREE area, or to start up in the DREE area, or industries which are already there and wish to modernize their enterprise. One of the requirements is that the business will invest at least a hundred thousand dollars in the enterprise themselves. Applications can be made through the SAO - (Société d'Aménagement de l'Outaouais) - or directly to the Department of Regional Economic Expansion at their Montreal office.

Subsidies, which are straight out non-returnable grants, can be from 20 to 25 percent of the value of the entire project, 80 percent at the start of production and the rest after two years.

This incentive has not brought any great industry into the area to fill the vacuum created by the closing of Hilton but possibly now that the SAO has appointed a development officer to work specifically in Pontiac County the DREE designation will begin to be an attraction to prospective industries.

Moved by Ryan seconded by Corriveau that the letter of resignation from Mrs Carole Asselin be accepted as is.

Moved by Ryan seconded by Corriveau, that Louise Lance be hired as secretary treasurer on a full time basis, 5 to 1.

Moved by Dumouchel seconded by Ryan that Mrs Germaine Lance be hired as substitute secretary treasurer.

Moved by Ryan seconded by Tremblay that Oscar Dumouchel be named inspector of Fences for the municipality.

Moved by Lagarde seconded by Tremblay that the council buy from Gerald Corriveau a piece of land for a turn out.

Moved by Ryan seconded by Dumouchel, that the gun owned by the council be sold to George Gauthier for the sum of \$25.

Moved by Ryan seconded by Corriveau that the Minister of Transport leave the roads in the same shape as they took them before the construction of the bridge.

Moved by Ryan seconded by Lagarde that a letter be send

to Mr Gerard Jobin requesting that they hire as many local men as possible when constructing the fifteen apartments for elderly people. Moved by Lagarde seconded by Gauthier that the council pay The Equity to publish the monthly meetings minutes in

English. Moved by Dumouchel seconded by Ryan, that Louise-Lance be authorized to co-sign all council cheques from now on. Moved by Dumouchel seconded by Ryan, adjournment of the meeting.

County executive committee reports to County Council

The newly appointed executive committee of County Council has performed a number of duties thus far in 1980 and made a complete report of their activities to County Council on Monday, March 10th at the regular quarterly session. The executive consists of Mayors Vibert, Piché, Schrankler, Black and Soucie.

Among the work of the executive were the following: They appointed Mrs Stella Sullivan to be Director for the Canada Works Project sponsored by County Council, interviewed eight candidates for work on the project and hired Helen Nephin, Brenda Landry and Charles Vallée for the jobs, with Norman Pilon as an alternate.

They held numerous conferences with the valuers Michel Lagacé Inc. regarding complaints from various municipalities and requested that the firm should put forward a plan in writing for immediate corrections to the valuation rolls that were unacceptable in their initial forms. This was done and the municipalities have been receiving corrected lists.

A vote taken at County Council subsequently determined that the firm would be paid in proportion to those municipalities which had received acceptable rolls and sent resolutions to that effect to the County Secretary, Mr Clifford Robillard.

The executive committee also has contacted the Department of Transport with regards to the establishment of a license bureau at the County Building in Campbell's Bay. This project is still open and County Council has reiterated interest in having the Department of Transport open a branch office of the Hull bureau at the County Building in Campbell's Bay.

Another concern of the executive has been the proposal by the CRDO that the registrar's office be moved out of Campbell's Bay to Hull. County Council furthermore decided to request that the CRDO should not speak on behalf of the interests of Pontiac County without first ascertaining by specific consultation the wishes of this County.

The engaging of an assistant to the Secretary Treasurer of the County was another task of the executive committee and after considering eight applicants, all well qualified, it was proposed that Mr Fernand Roy of Fort Coulonge be offered the job. This proposal was accepted at County Council after a brief discussion and Mr Roy will commence his duties on April 1st for an indefinite trial period.

ICA rep meets with County mayors

Mr Ken Fisher of Institute of Cultural Affairs spoke to County Council during their Monday, March 10 meeting. His institute is a voluntary group working throughout the world "meet the needs of communities". Mr Fisher cited various communities which had held "forums" under the leadership of the ICA and offered to convene similar forums in Pontiac County.

The forum would consist of a review of major accomplishments of the community in the past 30 years, a look at current obstacles to progress and some practical proposals of what can be done by the citizens of the community. After giving some examples of communities which had availed themselves of the services of the ICA through community forums, Mr Fisher said his organization was already working with certain groups throughout this County and could be reached for more information at their Ottawa address which is 123 Sherbrooke Avenue, 829-8524.

Otter Lake Crafts Centre

The group has elected a Provisional Committee whose role was to propose the internal bylaws of the new corporation. Doreen Dagenais, Carole Dale, Brigitte St-Aubin, Ghislaine Lévesque, Colombe Latreille, Marie-Marthe Séguin and Omer St-Aubin are members of this Committee.

The general meeting was held on March 11th to elect a Board of Directors and to accept the internal bylaws proposed.

The Committee is now searching for an appropriate building in Otter Lake. The Crafts Centre would promote the talents of the crafts people of this area by exhibiting and selling their products.





The Francophone Cultural Committee of Algonquin College in Pembroke will be sponsoring a performance by singer-composer Robert Paquette, on March 26, 1980, at 8:30 p.m.

Allan and Eleanor Black have received a Valentine note from Louis and Joanne Terzich of Minneapolis. They praise Canada's actions in the return of the six hostages and state they couldn't have better neighbours. The Terzich's have always loved Canada and although it is almost fifteen years since they left here, have always kept in contact with the Blacks. Those in the area who were affiliated with Hilton Mines, will remember the Terrichs when they lived here for a time in Shawville.

The English and French departments of Pontiac Protestant High School will be presenting their annual drama festival on March 20, 24, 25 and 26th at 8 p.m.

To accent their feeling of belonging to the Province of Quebec, the people of Chapeau should be able to receive Radio-Québec on channel 30 later this year, by virtue of a \$250,000 transmitter which is supposed to be built this summer.

Having persuaded the Supreme Court of Canada to rule that all official documents must be in both French and English, contrary to the exigencies of Bill 101 which wanted them all in French, now the lawyers are getting the Supreme Court to designate which documents have to be in both languages. This is to avoid the horrendous expense of putting all the municipal and school board records into both languages.

The people of Maniwaki, in their usual strong, well unified, and well organized way, are telling the Transport Commission that they must not permit the Canadian Pacific Railway to be removed from the track up the Gatineau. A work-horizons project in Hull will repair the bindings on old school books. The project will provide work for six young people and if it is successful several similar projects might be opened in the region, to repair furniture and shoes.

An odd controversy is shaping up in Gatineau County where the County Council wants to see a cheese factory established and the milk producers don't. Hard to see why the producers are against it but it almost looks as if they are irked because they weren't consulted before the idea went public.

A project agent from the direction of the job creation branch of Manpower and Immigration will be at our Canada Employment Centre in Campbell's Bay on March 20th and 27th, 1980 to discuss projects within the student summer employment program. For further information dial 648-2146. Remember the deadline for applications is Friday, March 28th, 1980.

A funeral co-op trying to get organized in the Outaouais needed two thousand members to get off the ground. They only could recruit 550 but they're still trying.

A recent survey has established that Quebecers are more interested in sports than in cultural activities. Well, who says that sports are not cultural activities? And bear in mind that as far as Pontiac is concerned, five of our municipalities maintain great public libraries along with the usual hockey and baseball activities, which only means that books, music and art are also appreciated.

Old age pensions, income supplements and allocation to spouses will increase as of April to keep up with the increased cost of living, according to the Federal Department of Health and Welfare.

Daycare, pre-school and extended day care in Shawville

Provisional members of the day care center committee have investigated several possibilities for a home for the center and have found a lovely home with a large yard for an outdoor play area on Main Street in Shawville. This home should satisfy most of the regulations which the provincial departments of health and social affairs require. The committee is now able to set down fee schedules for part-time and full-time children who will participate in the center's programs.

Committee members hope to provide several different types of services to meet the varied needs of this community. Working parents will be able to leave their children at the center on a full-time basis. Depending on the demand the center could provide nursing care for very small babies, (the center will take babies over 3 months of age), a stimulating educational environment for pre-schoolers and toddlers (toilet training not required), a hot lunch every day and an extended day care service for children before school, during the lunch hour and after school for 5 - 11 year olds.

Unemployed mothers and part-time working mothers will also be able to take advantage of the center's services on a part time basis. Parents interested in only the pre-schoolers nursery school program will be able to leave their children (between the ages of 3 and 5) at the center in the morning several times per week.

The committee is now trying to estimate the probable costs of these services; but it is expected that fees will range between \$5 - \$9 per day. Low income families may take advantage of day care because of the subsidies provided by the Ministry of Social Affairs.

A short questionnaire is provided for interested parents to help organizers establish a daycare center in the Shawville area which hopefully will be operating by September 1st, 1980. For more information call Mrs Roxanne Bretzlaff at 647-3641.



Une garderie à Fort-Coulonge


